However, Mr. Hough stated that in reality no other asset was needed for Florida except its climate as practically all the homesite buyers in the section were buying on account of the fact that they liked the wonderful equable climate of the Okeechobee district and preferred the mild winters and delightful summers of Okeechobee to the rigorous winters and sweltering summers of older parts of the country.
