PROJECTS WIN SENATE'S VOTE

Upper House For Outlay of \$800,000 On River, \$200,000 On Harbor.

\$9.000,000 PROGRAM FOR OKEECHOBEE

Measure Passes Without Record_Ballot; Quick House Action Seen.

By GLADSTONE WILLIAMS. Mersid's Special Washington Correspondent. WASHINGTON, June 30 .- Passage by the senate today of the new rivers and herbors bill opens the way for a number of important improvements in navigation and flood control projects of Miami and south Florida.

The senate retained without revision the two amendments affecting the Minmi harbor and the Caloosahatchee-Lake Okeechobee flood control works ordered by the senate commerce committee after the bill came over from the lower house. Due to these and other amendments, the measure now gues to conference between the two houses before being submitted to tresident Hoover for his signature. Prompt and favorable action is expected in the In addition to the Miami harbor and

Calcosahatchee-Okeschobee items, the bill authorized an expenditure of \$800,000 for the improvements of the Minmi river in the interest of flood control and navigation.

Both the Miami harbor and Calcosahatches-Okeschobes Items were amendod advantageously by the senate through the efforts of Senator Fletcher and Senator Trammell of Florida, who -operated in the work.

Under the Miami amendment, the ntire harbor project as recommended by the army engineers was authorized whereas the house ordered only a part of the improvement. While the senate mendment does not authorize any additional funds over the \$200,000 house item, the way will be open to have additional funds alloted out of future var department appropriations for rivers and harbors without the necessity for additional legislation.

As for the Okeechobee project, Senaor Trammel succeeded in gaining s material reduction in the amount the state of Florida will be required to con toward the approximately \$9,000,000 program. His amendment requires a state contribution of only

The first sum fixed for the state's share was \$4.448.000.

The present bill merely is an authorisation of the several projects listed and does not carry appropriations. An appropriation bill making the funds actually available will come along later. If not at this session, then early in the session next December. All of the senate amendments on Fiorida projects are expected to be approved by the conference without change.

The bill also carries the amendment for widening the interconstal canal from 75 to 100 feet between Miami and Jack

Assert New Law Will Spur Prosperity.

MELLON-WATSON VIEWS PRESENTED

Statements Given In Answer To Attacks By Democratic Leaders.

[BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.] WASHINGTON, June 20 .- Two adninistration champions - Secretary Mellon and Senator Watson of Indiana -came forward tonight to defend the newly-enacted Smoot-Hawley tariff law as Democrats peppered away with their assault on the legislation.

In a formal statement, the treasury secretary said the new law removes an obstacle to business recovery "by elimnating the uncertainty of the last 15 nonths" and makes a contribution to business stability "by its promise of more business-like revision in the future.'

Over the radio, Senator Watson, the Republican leader, said the increased agricultural rates provided by the bill "added prosperity and in creased purchasing power to a third of the people of the country."

close relationship with Al Capone, The Miami Daily News now charges me with being a frequenter of the Capone household on Palm Island, and to sustain its contention, prints a telegram, sent collect, by T. W. (Tub) Palmer to the publisher of The News To those who know Tub, the "collect" is characteristic.

. It is true that sometime during the winter of 1928-1929 I went to the residence of Al Capone on Palm Island with T. W. (Tub) Palmer. I went at Palmer's request and as his attorney. Neither of us was acquainted with Capone. Tub introduced me; I introduced Tub and Capone introduced himself. The relationship between Palmer and me at that time was that of client and attorney, a confidential professional relationship which, until today, I was not at liberty to disclose. My business relations on that day were with Palmer and not with Capone; I represented Palmer, not Capone.

Palmer was about to lose the Columbus Hotel. He needed money, a lot of it. He asked me to go with him as his attorney. in an effort to borrow money from Capone to tide him over his financial troubles with the Columbus Hotel. We went together for that purpose. We presented the proposition to Capone. Capone was not interested in any investments here and said so promptly. We stayed a short time and left. I have never been in the Capone residence since that time. I have never stated that I was never in the Capone residence at any time. I have stated I have never had any business, professional or social relations with Capone. I now repeat that assertion. Incidentally, Tub later lost the hotel.

I have never discussed this matter before, because I am not in the habit of divulging business affairs which come to me in connection with my profession. I do not know what animated Palmer to answer the telegram of The Miami Daily News and try to place the culpability upon me, when the visit was made only in his interest. I do not know what pressure has been brought upon Palmer to induce him to take this action. He has never paid me for my services, but, knowing Tub, I have never held that against him. I do think, however, that Tub should have paid the charges on the telegram sent "collect" to The Daily
