"Indications are that the loan probably will be the most attractive that the government has ever offered its investors," Mr. Griffin continued. "In addition int probably will be the last opportunity for believers in government bonds to get them at par, for there will be no more liberty loans—that has been definitely decided—and there is no indication just now-of any other demand that would necessitate another bond issue soon."

Mr. Griffin declares the present organization will be kept intact as far as possible for the last loan. "The officials are especially pleased with the work of the county organizations, which pulled both Tampa and Hillsborough county into the real honor class."
