"I rejoice in the rapidly increasing interest in the United States in everything related to South and Contral America, Mexico and the Caribbean Islands, yet I often regret that special articles by special writers dealing with things of an extraordinary or exceptional nature, weaknesses of our social life and the eccentricities of individuals, occupy so much space. A newspaper should tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. But if much spate is devoted to reporting the folius and faillings of a few, there is no chance to give a correct impression of the great accomplishments of a race."


