

"I don't believe the state attorney should stand here and confess that he is not big enough to keep these witnesses protected," the judge said. "Besides Mr. Bere is big enough to take care of himself."

"Not when he is faced with a machine gun," Butler replied. "I am not impressed with the rea son given for wanting this nolle prosse, but I yield to your judgment as the prosecuting attorney," Judge Prystalski said.

Bere later said he had never been threatened, except during the rob-bery, but that a new trial would "be too much trouble and take too much time," and that he was needed at the


