Peterson polled 117 votes more than Drane according to the official returns in the primary. Attorneys for Drane explained the mandamus order, issued by Circuit Judge Taylor, was to ascertain the true vote and that if it were found the returns had been correctly counted the result would be accepted without contest.

Iregularities Charged

The petition for the writ, after reciting that official returns gave Drane 37,398 votes and Peterson 37,515 for the first district nomination, charged that irregularities and errors were permitted in the count by election clerks and inspectors in the six districts cited.

It charged that clerks and inspectors counted ballots improperly marked for Peterson while at the same time throwing out ballots improperly marked for Drane, In addition it was charged that in the Frostproof precinct the vote was not recorded in the official tally books as required by law, but instead the polls officials attempted to return the tally sheets made by themselves, without appending the required oath.

Says Outsider Helped

one Lakeland precinct a worker for Peterson, not an official in the precinct, was permitted to call the ballots clerks and inspectors were present.

The petition sets forth that because of the alleged irregular methods employed in the count, a re-canvass will show a far greater number legally cast for Drane and fewer for Peterson than is indicated in the report to the county canvassing board.

\$3,000,000 To Be Allocated for Okeechobee

WEST PALM BEACH, Aug. 4 .-(Associated Press.)-Plans of the war department to build 44 miles of levee and channels and construct other costly flood control works in Lake Okeechobee and the St. Lucie canal between now and the end of 1933 were revealed here today.

The schedule of work was outlined by Maj, B. J. Dunn, federal district engineer of Jacksonville, in a letter to County Engineer Jake Boyd, Boyd Another charge made was that in will incorporate the information in a report to Governor Carlton.

Major Dunn mentioned no appropriations for the work but published although all the regularly appointed reports from Washington said the war department intended to allocate more than \$3,000,000 for the work next year, which sum would augment \$2,-133,000 to finance the projects for the current year.
