Rittor and Akorman Appointments Confirmed In Short Session.

NO INDICATION OF OPPOSITION

Protest By Republican Organization Leaders Is Disregarded.

Washing'don, Fob. 18,—Disro garding protests filed by Republican organization leaders in the state, the senate late today confirmed the nominations of Haisted L. Ritter, of Talm Heach, and Alexander Akerman, of Orlando, as United States district Judges for the Southern distriot of Florida.

Confirmation was effected in an expoutive session which, because of its belotness, indicated that not a single volos was raised in opposition. The executive session fasted barely more than five minutes.

Mr. Altter fills the vacancy caused the death of Judge Rhydon M. Call of Jacksonville, while Mr. Akerman was appointed to the new Judgeship created by the present congress.

The southern district of the state, subracing Jacksonville, Tampa and Miami, now has three federal Judges.
