PHILADELPHIA, March 17 .- Alphone "Scarface Al" Capone and his bodyguard, Frank Cline, walked to freedom teday from the new state prison a Graterford, Pa., while hundreds of eurious men, women and children, newspapermen and photographers awaited their release in front of the Eastern State penitentiary in this city, / 80 inlies away. "The big guy went out from here at 8 o'clock this morning. We shot him away in a brown automobile, direct to the new Eastern penitentiary at Grater-

Work To Be Done In Co operation With Florida Authorities.

[BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.] WASHINGTON, March 17,-Approve of the war department was placed today upon projects designed to bring the levees in the Caloosahatchee river and neight which would protect the inhabitants against extraordinary and unexsected flood dangers.

In sending a recommendation to the enate commerce committee for \$9,602. 000 for six projects to improve navi gation and control floods in the area in which a heavy loss of lives has been suffered in pas thurrican disasters, he war department proposed to raise by three feet the height of the levees suggested by local engineers.

The department considered the level roposed by the local engineers suficlent to hold the waters of Lake Okeechobes unless they should be whipped by a severe storm. Such a levee, the department said, might induce such confidence as would cause the low lands to be thickly settled when "greater loss of life and larger property damage

might result from its failure." "The safety of the lives of the in nabitants," the department report said, "the protection of their property, and the future development of the Everglades depends upon the levees being made high enough and strong enough o be safe against any contingency which can be reasonably anticipated." Dr. Dudvik Hektoen of the University of Chicago, one of the last to be stricken, was conducting research work there. Although seriously ill, the surgeon general said Dr. Hektoen was slightly improved tonight.

Dr. Cumming said health authorities were still baffled as to the method of communication of the disease, since some of those now slok were never in contact with the dead parrots being experimented with.

"At least three of the doctors now garded as serious.". ill," he asserted, "were never within 30 feet of the psittacosis laboratory."

"Perhaps the parrot fever germs were carried by dust or perhaps by insects The entire laboratory, from cellar to chimneý, has already been fumigated and then sprayed with bichloride of

The surgeon general added that the extreme communicableness of the disease was definitely established, and that most of the research activities of the laboratory had been moved to other buildings.

The laboratory will be fumigated again, he added, adding that he felt many of the workers there had already been endangered because of the prowded quarters in which they were housed.
