CARLTON'S GRADUATED FEE BILL IS AMENDED

Commanding Much Interest Now That Wilder's Salary Bill Is In the Discard

TALLAITASSEE, May 2.—(Special)—
The Wilder bill to abolish fees and put to county officials on a straightout salary basis having died in House committee, the graduated fee system bill introduced by Mr. Carlton of Hillsborough-Phellas in the Senate is commanding more interest.

Some slight amendments have been made to the Carlton bill. In its present form it is as follows:

Senate Bill No. 223, by Mr. Carlton of the Eleventh District. An act fixing the compensition of all county officials now paid in whole or in part on the basis of fees or commissions.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. The compensation of sach county official not paid in whole or in part on the basis of fees or commission-ors shall be fixed by the net income of such office according to the following schedule:

All the net income from such office not to exceed eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800); sixty per cent of the next two thousand dollars (\$2,000), or any fraction thereof; forty per cent of the next two thousand dollars (\$2,000), or any fraction thereof; twenty per cent of the next two thousand dollars (\$2,000), or any fraction thereof; the per cent of the set and residue.

Section 2. Each official shall appoint his deputies, clerks or assistants. The Board of County Commissioners shall fix the number and compensation of said deputies, clerks, or assistants.
